News & Notes

Sebastian's wife was in a car accident: Sebastian's wife was on her way to pick up Olga in Chiluvuru, about 4-5 miles out of Hyderabad, they lost the brakes in the car, and hit a tree. All is well and no one was seriously hurt. Not only was this a harrowing experience but it also had the unfortunate side effect of delaying the surveying process as Olga, unaware of the accident, was waiting with 4-5 engineers.

Olga gets sick on last trip: The last trip was more than Olga bargained for as she got sick and was unable to spend as much time contacting an architect or getting the land surveyed.

Menno-Clinic, India Board tightens bonds with Emma Mennonite Church: In a move to improve communication, minutes and treasurer's reports from the monthly Menno-Clinic, India Board meetings will be sent to the Emma Mennonite Church Council.

Program at Shore Mennonite Church: Doc Yarlagadda, Dawn Miller, and Andrea Philbrook gave the morning service at Shore Mennonite Church on April 11, 1999. The theme was on Missions. Dawn and Andrea shared from their trip to India. They shared their joys, disappointments and life impressions. Doc Yarlagadda gave the morning message. He spoke of his love and response to God and also, his response to the people of his home village in India. Doc shared his concern that all people know Christ.

Plans for Menno-Clinic to be designed by Indian architects: Even with all the setbacks with the car accident and Olga's failed health, an architect from the region has been contacted. The board is pleased to have been able to get a hold of local expertise in this matter as this architect has experience with hospitals in India. Also the land is cleared and surveyed. God has allowed progress in the midst of seeming setbacks. The board is optimistic about future plans being delivered in the next several weeks.

Finding the Balance

The Board struggles to find the appropriate balance between western medical practices and assumptions and Indian customs

As the Menno-Clinic, India board continues planning for the construction of the clinic building in Chiluvuru, one of the issues that is always at hand, is how much western influence should be reflected in the building and medical practices. The culture and practices of India are so much different than most of us can imagine, yet must be considered very seriously if the clinic is to be effective in its outreach. Such things as the placement of entrances must be done according to Indian culture, or people will not enter the clinic. And yet the clinic must be built in such a way as to promote quality medical care. We ask that you continue to pray for the board, as we move from rough sketches to the preliminary drawings of an architect, that the correct balance will be found.
